Here in the picture below is a ceshmé. (Taken with a regular camera)






The planet Narop is quite similar to Earth, the only difference being that on Narop they use ceshmes and on Earth they use cameras.

Here in the picture is the Planet Narop. (Photographed with a ceshmé)




Here in the picture is the Planet Narop.



Once something flew past the planet Manadtjett. (and Räwe took a picture of it with a human camera)






The studio.

In this picture, Räwe is playing "60s at Narop" with his grandfather.




When Räwe saw this shooting star, he was inspired to write the song "Starfall" which later reached number 1 on Narop's "Top 7 list". (Taken with camera)
